# Natural Resource Management



**Natural resources – forests, agricultural and pasture lands, livestock and water – provide the base for livelihood for millions of rural families in developing and transition countries.**



Rural livelihoods in the wide sense of identity, autonomy, dignity, employment and income depend to a large extent on the sustainable management of natural resources. Short-term needs of higher production and long term protection goals need to be combined in order to benefit small farmers, forest dwellers and herders in a lasting way.

Intercooperation specializes in a wide range of themes: from livestock and agricultural production, integrated water resource management, participatory innovation development, livelihood approaches, to collaborative forest management, tropical and agroforestry, biodiversity and mitigation and adaptation measures in response to climate change. Intercooperation pays particular attention to the roles and responsibilities of women as managers of natural resources.

Intercooperation works mainly through partner organisations providing thematic, conceptual and methodological support. It is engaged in human and institutional development and contributes to the improvement of framework conditions through the facilitation of policy dialogue at national and international level. Intercooperation's expertise and credibility at meso- and macro-levels is based on its experience working with rural communities in all continents. These communities are not only strengthened in their technical capacity but also in their role as rights holders.

The Forest-Environment Team and the Agriculture Team as well as the Climate Change Group within Intercooperation have the mandate to mobilise the competences needed to support partners and programmes.

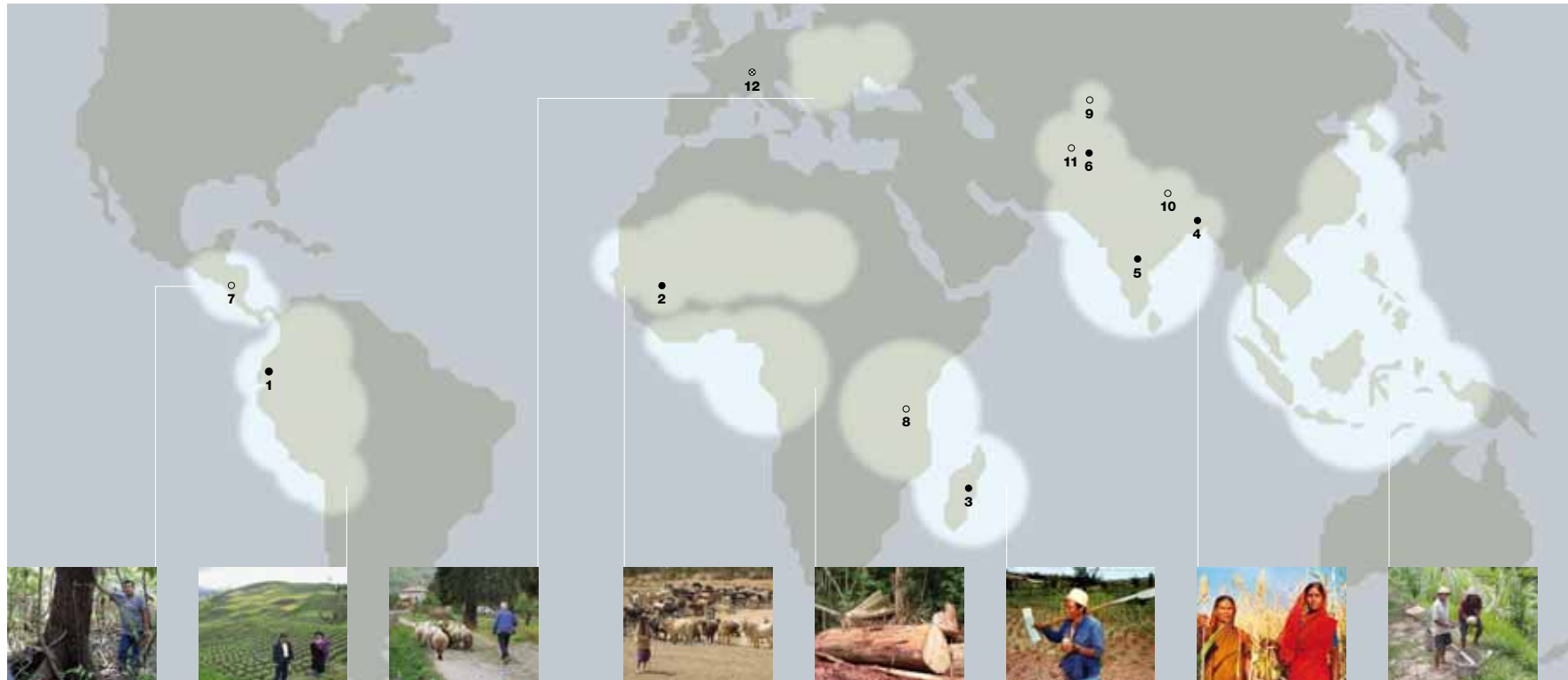

# Rural Economy



**Through the production, transformation and marketing of goods and services, poor rural people and communities find employment and engage in income-generating activities, enabling them to take part in economic growth.**

A sustainable development is not possible without lasting economic growth and a broad-based participation of all segments of society in this growth. In transition countries, a successful change towards a market economy is considered a precondition for political and social transformation.

Natural resources are the main assets of rural areas and the basis for the production of agricultural, livestock and forest goods and for the provision of environmental services. Intercooperation facilitates the integration of poor rural households, producer groups and small enterprises into the economic mainstream and aims at strengthening their market position. The fostering of the role of women as economic protagonists is of particular importance for the enhancement of living standards in rural communities.

Intercooperation specializes in its activities on three main approaches: 1) facilitating the lasting access to financial services (i.e. savings, credit and micro-insurances), 2) strengthening of value chains – particularly of forestry and agricultural products, including organic and fair-trade products – between producers and consumers, namely by reinforcing the bargaining power of small rural producers and enterprises, and 3) supporting small enterprises and their associations through business support services.

The Finance-Enterprise-Market Team at Intercooperation relies on in-house competence and specialized consultants for the support of partners and programmes.

# Local Governance and Civil Society



**Local Governance refers to the way state, communities and people organise themselves at local level. Good local governance includes the principles of subsidiarity, accountability and the participation of civil society.**

The Municipal and Local Development team is the competence centre within Intercooperation on issues of local governance. It works with a range of Swiss and International specialized institutions and experts.

Traditional forms of local self-organisation are often in conflict with the central state and its administration. Political devolution, administrative and fiscal decentralisation are seen as a means of bringing the requirements of a modern democratic state in line with a great diversity of local societal structures. Through these processes politics are expected to become more inclusive, administrations more accountable and service delivery more effective. Additional objectives are to stop resource transfers from the periphery to the centre, to reduce the danger of corruption, and to foster local economic development.

Intercooperation supports the re-enforcement of municipalities and local governments in general. It accompanies processes of political, administrative and fiscal decentralisation, strengthens the delivery of effective local services and facilitates the inclusion of civil society, discriminated communities and women in local governments. Intercooperation has specific experience in conflict and post-conflict situations and the inclusion of minorities in political processes.
